We take seriously Jesus' call to examine ourselves before we come together around the Lord's table (Matthew 26:21-24). We are called to seek reconciliation with our brothers and sisters where there is brokenness so that we can come before God as a unified community. We are not called to assign blame, decide who is right or wrong, declare a winner, or judge anyone. Doing these things in fact condemns us. We are instead to seek reconciliation. This requires us to overcome our human tendency to let our assumptions rule us, and listen instead to what others have to say respectfully and with an open mind so that we can come together before the Lord.
