The human tendencies to look for or create villains; or play the blame game rather than taking responsibility for our own actions, are in the forefront with encouragement from some leaders who regularly do both. The continuing damage being done by past wrongs that have too long been denied rather than corrected, has repeatedly showed a very public face bringing loud cries for change by many, and yet tragically denial and even praise from some. There are a favored few who abuse power and take advantage of the privileges of their positions for their own good at the expense of everyone else; heartbreakingly, with the largely unwitting support from some of those they hurt the most. *Pray for forgiveness where you have contributed to harming others through self-centeredness*.

Yes, this is not the first time the world has been torn apart by deceit, greed, or the thirst for power. It is also not the first time disease has ravaged the population bringing suffering and death to thousands. Yet, once again the message of Christmas is the same. In a manger in Bethlehem, a baby came to bring light and peace to the world! No, he did not bring a bit of magic that can 'fix' everything as we sit back and watch. He brought the good news that there is a new way to live that comes from God. It requires commitment and daily effort on our part. It requires constant striving for wisdom and truth as we work at living together with all our differences and gifts for the good of all. Just as remembering the coming of Jesus has done in the past, Christmas offers an opportunity to start again fresh to make the world a better place. The world that baby was born into in Bethlehem was not perfect either, but with him, hope was born and the tools we need to make a difference for good came with his ministry.
