A thaw is coming! For the first time in weeks, I can see grass outside my window. The tips of spring flower shoots are also making their first appearance. Though I enjoy the snow – walking taller because it

This week, remember in prayer:

- People dealing with COVID-19 & the problems the pandemic is creating for people & their communities especially where poverty, unrest, corruption, or other circumstances make dealing with the pandemic more difficult.
- Nigeria kidnapping for ransom is a growing problem. Boko Haram attacks continue
 as do attacks by Fulani herders and bandits. The effects of COVID-19 are also being
 felt. There is still no further word on the Chibok school girls.
- People who live with the ugliness of racism, bigotry, or prejudice because we have
 not learned the lessons Jesus taught about how we should treat each other, or the
 lessons our past has tried to teach us about the dehumanizing nature of fear & the allconsuming & destructive power of hate.
- Those who are victims of hate crimes. The incidents of such crimes against Asian Americans have been increasing dramatically in recent months.
- Victims of gun violence. There has been a rash of incidences in which young children have had access to guns and unintentionally killed family members in recent days. 45 children under 11 have been killed & 86 injured already this year. There have been 257 unintentional shooting this year. 6,384 (which includes 3,630 suicides) people have been killed by gun violence this year. (Gun Violence Archive)

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
