- **The people of Haiti** – Their president was assassinated last night. As the poorest country in the western hemisphere, they already face many difficulties.
- **Yet another group of school children kidnaped in Nigeria** – at least 140 children from the Bethel Baptist School in Western Nigeria, Kaduna state & several adults in nearby locations have been taken. This is the 4th such attack in 5 months. 25 students & a teacher have returned but the rest remain missing. Since December, more than 1,000 students have been taken, at least 9 have been killed; more than 200 are still missing. Many parents have pulled their children out of school, & now many schools have been closed because of the danger. This is a major blow to much needed education, in a place where education is not routine, especially for girls. (Washington Post 7-5-2021)
