Boko Haram, bandits & criminal gangs along with corrupt military & government officials continues to be a threat, especially in parts of the country that have become "ungoverned spaces" where the people are at the mercy of these criminals.

 The 2022 gun death total is now 12,030. 439 deaths & 1,058 of the injured are children (17 or younger). Many states, including Ohio, are weakening gun laws, even though the number of homicides & other gun crimes increases where gun laws are weakened. There are 393 million civilian owned guns in the U. S. more guns than cars.
