Pray For Those Working to End Violence

This Sunday, October 2, is the International Day of Non-Violence (so designated by the U.N. in 2007). The day is set aside to encourage people around the world to spread the message of nonviolence through education and raising public awareness of the importance of encouraging a



culture of peace, tolerance, and understanding between people and nations. The date was chosen because it was the birthday of Mahatma Gandhi, the Indian leader who taught the world about the power of nonviolence in the face of violence and oppression, when he led India to independence without going to war with Britain.

Most of the world does not know peace. Of the 195 countries in the world, less than a dozen are currently at peace. The U.S. has only been at peace for 21 years in all its 246 years as a country. Most of the military operations launched in the world since World War II have been launched by the U.S. No one born after 2000 has ever lived in this country at peace.

Pray for those who work to improve life for people in their communities without the use of violence. Pray that world leaders will learn to solve problems peacefully. Remember those who face the daily threat of violence. Pray for the strength and wisdom we need to work together for peace between people and between nations.

Remember in Prayer:

- Victims of Gun Violence 32,190 people died in gun violence this year, including 1,209 children. 28,839 people have been injured including 3,281 children. There have been 496 mass shootings in 2022.
- All those dealing with natural disasters: drought, fires, flooding, earthquakes, & storms. A third of Pakistan is still under water from flooding. Turkey is experiencing flooding. Japan, Alaska, Florida, & the Caribbean are dealing with storms.
- Countries Dealing with Major Political and/or Economic Upheaval including Sri Lanka, Venezuela, the Philippines, South Africa, Nigeria, South Sudan, Myanmar, Democratic Republic of Congo, Columbia, Syria, Afghanistan. . .
- Women & Girls who are treated as second class citizens in many countries including Afghanistan.
- Ukraine where the war continues as does hunger, the risk of epidemic disease, & the risk of nuclear disaster. At least 8 million people are still refugees outside their country.
- The continuing COVID Pandemic. Some states have dropped reporting requirements so official case numbers are probably low. A new vaccine booster covering current strains, is out. Long COVID is a continuing problem.

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
