Our leaders as they make decisions that will affect people here and around the world - This is an excerpt from a letter signed by the Church of the Brethren, 31 other groups, and some 70 individuals to the 2020 presidential candidates calling for a reduction in military spending and redirection of those funds to address needs such as poverty, hunger, education, healthcare, and the environment, among others: "While roughly 40 million people in the United States are not sure they can afford enough food for their family, Congress and the president have agreed to spend more than \$70 billion of our nation's resources on another year of fighting overseas wars," the letter said, in part (this will increase spending on the military by at least \$20 billion over last year). "Salaries for the nation's teachers have fallen by 4.5% over the past decade, yet our latest budget devotes another \$9 billion for F-35 war planes. Veterans of our nation's wars are dying of suicide and drug overdose at alarming rates, yet Congress is poised to spend well over a trillion dollars to refurbish a nuclear weapons arsenal for a type of war that Ronald Reagan once said "cannot be won and must never be fought.
