

... for I was a stranger and you welcomed me... (Matt 25:35)

The Brethren have answered the call to 'welcome the stranger' by helping refugees for over 100 years. We helped victims of the Armenian genocide in 1915 and continue helping refugees when ever and where ever we can¹. When contacted by the Huffington Post about the Church of the Brethren position on refugees, Jay Wittmeyer, executive director of Global Mission and Service said: "We are the church, we'll continue to be the church, and we will welcome refugees in need from all religious backgrounds. This is in keeping with our Christian faith."²

General secretary David Steele on behalf of the Church of the Brethren has signed a letter to President Trump and members of Congress expressing support for refugee resettlement. The letter, which has now been signed by more than 2,000 religious leaders from across the country--and is still open to receiving more signatures--is an initiative of the Interfaith Immigration Coalition.

The coalition is "a partnership of faith-based organizations committed to enacting fair and humane immigration reform that reflects our mandate to welcome the stranger and treat all human beings with dignity and respect." The coalition is connected with Church World Service (CWS), which is a longterm partner organization of the Church of the Brethren and the denomination's disaster ministries.³

The Brethren are also participating in TOGETHER, "a global initiative that promotes respect, safety and dignity for everyone forced to flee their homes in search of a better life." This United Nations initiative also strives to promote "tolerance, tear down the walls of discrimination, and reveal the cruelties in xenophobic behavior and policies towards migrants and refugees. The UN Department of Public Information (DPI), of which Church of the Brethren is a member, launched TOGETHER at the first 2017 NGO (non-governmental organization) and DPI briefing Thursday, January 26th.
