"In everything set them an example..." - Titus 2:7

Inspired by the Holy Spirit, the apostle Paul wrote these words in his letter to young pastor Titus in the work of leading the church on Crete. This mandate is our theme verse as we meet July 29-30 for our District Conference at Maple Grove Church of the Brethren. In our time together we will use the greater context of Titus 2:1-8 in hopes of gaining a clearer understanding of a model of congregational life that is regarded by many as 'old school.' As we will see, Paul gave Titus some valuable insight into Body life and vitality that still holds great value for us today as we seek to be "people of the Book." It is a call to unity in the body of believers as intentional relationships are formed and nurtured involving those of various age groups. It calls us back to teaching/mentoring, and it bids us return to a humble, teachable spirit. It calls us to see all the parts of the community of faith as today's church. It may well call us to change...

You will notice our venue is once again a local church, and that decision was made by the Central Committee based on evaluations by delegates at the 2015 gathering at Mohican. Last year's conference-goers overwhelmingly favored the more intimate setting of the local church, and Central Committee was pleased with a significant cost savings over a University setting. As you have noticed, we are once again at a site more centrally located in the district but that will not always be the case. While there are only a handful of our congregations that have facilities suitable for a conference, it is the intent of Central Committee to move conference around to various congregations within the district. Host churches will be encouraged to enlist volunteers from the surrounding congregations, strengthening the understanding that "we" are the district.





Each spring, the Akron/Canton area Church of the Brethren congregations gather together each Sunday evening during the Lenten season for a time of worship and fellowship. This year, these services began on the second Sunday of Lent (February 21) with a total of four combined services that ended with a festival of choirs on March 13. The congregations that participate in these services each year are Akron Eastwood, Akron First,

Akron Springfield, Center, Eden, East Nimishillen, Freeburg, Hartville, Mount Pleasant, and Water Street.

The theme for these services focused upon Jesus' three predictions of the Cross as found in the Gospel of Mark (8:31ff, 9:30ff, 10:32ff). Unique to this year's services was the opportunity to hear some of the area's licensed ministers who do not currently serve a congregation have the opportunity to deliver the message, and each of them did a wonderful job.

In addition to gathering together for worship, these services also serve another purpose that benefits the Northern Ohio District. 100% of the offerings that were collected during the Lenten services are given to the district to support the Student Ministers Fund. This year, the total amount collected during these services

Northern Ohio District Fellowship located in Fostoria, Ohio

- A charter membership group of 18 people will be recognized in worship on Pentecost Sunday, 5/15.
- Three monthly collections of food to assist the Food Pantry Plus in Fostoria totaled 68 jars of peanut butter, 108 tooth brushes, 127 tubes of tooth paste, 5 dental care kits, 133 cans of soup, 41 bottles of shampoo, 7 bars of soap, 65 cans of tuna, 52 sticks of deodorant, a few dozen misc. items, and \$275.00 in donations.
- We are partnering with Fostoria's Summer Park Program to bring groups of young people to Good Shepherd Home to develop a relationship with an adult mentor as they work together on community projects.

Farwell & God Speed to Our First District Peace Worker



Paul Moser Martin died April 11, 2016 at the age of 94. Paul was a teacher, pastor, and the first Northern Ohio District Peace Worker.

In 1970 the Northern Ohio District created a Peace Task Team to "send Peace Education Literature yearly to all high school students and to be a resource for local congregations, Bible studies and individuals." The Team also did workshops and other training in the District. By 1980 the Team felt the need of a staff person to emphasize and facilitate this work and on August 24, 1980 they recommended to Missions & Social Action of the District Board that the staff position of Peaceworker be created. Bruce Rosenberger, Debbie Beer, Wayne Hochstetler, and Gloria Kindy served on the Commission at the time. In 1982 Noel Bradt, Clyde Fry, Wayne Hochstetler, and Penny Cameron (BVS Peace Worker) began work on

the process of setting up an Endowment Fund to provide funding for the staff position and for district, congregational, and community education and action programs. In 1983 Paul Martin became the first District Peace Worker. He served in that position from 1983 to 1988. Paul laid a good foundation for the Peaceworkers who would follow him, continuing to be supporting and encouraging of the work after his tenure in the position.

Paul brought a unique background to this ministry. He was born to Presbyterian missionary parents in Brazil on October 28, 1921 and never tired of telling stories of growing up there. His Brazilian flag and 20 foot plus long anaconda snake skin made many trips to all kinds of presentations about his birth country. His Brazilian bird traps made frequent appearances at the District Peace Auction, an annual event at District Conference after 1988 to support the Peace Endowment Fund. One of the delights of Paul's later years was taking his family to Brazil to visit the home of his youth. Paul came to the U.S. to go the school, graduating from Bluffton College (General Conference Mennonite school) in 1948. He got his master's degree and taught 5th and 6th grade at Northwood Elementary school for 33 years. He was a much loved teacher who had a special way with children. His caring for them in the classroom and beyond was a life long vocation. Long after his retirement from teaching he continued to tutor children in the local schools and help children learn to plant and tend gardens.

Following his retirement from teaching, Paul and his wife Helen were licensed and then ordained into the ministry May 16, 1982 in the Church of the Brethren from the Lakewood Congregation. They were co-pastors at the Oak Grove, OH, Blissfield, IN, and Richland, OH congregations. They later also served an interim pastors twice for the First Church of the Brethren in Mansfield, Ohio.

Paul's witness for peace began in his youth. During World War II, Paul was a conscientious objector. He did alternative service in forestry camps in the west where he engaged in dangerous back-breaking manual labor. Then, following the war, he served as a Seagoing Cowboy, helping take cows and horses to Europe to help replace the livestock lost during the war. Paul's commitment to peace was strong and communicated in his manor of living and relating to people. His students, parishioners, and colleagues report that Paul was never critical or judgmental. He was always encouraging and uplifting to those around him. Paul was known as a peaceful, gentle, spirit-filled man who loved life and people. He and Helen always had an extra bed for a weary traveler and offered a helping hand to those in need.

Paul is survived by his wife of 64 years Helen (Knoke) Martin and four children Bonnie (Robinson) Taylor, Linda (Jim) Lynch, Neal (Beth) Martin, and Steve (Lori) Martin. Paul chose to be of service after death as well by donating his body to the Toledo College of Medicine. The family has asked that in lieu of flowers, donations go the Habitat For Humanity in Paul's name.

We are writing to express our joy and appreciation as the leaders of the Christ's Closet ministry at Eastwood Church of the Brethren for the Hottle Grant aid we received last fall. We have been working on this ministry for the last 3 ½ years and although we have made strides in growth, we had hurdles we could not successfully overcome without the help. We have been blessed with the support of our congregation, yet projects remained that we did not have the funds to complete. This grant allowed us to amplify our ministry to further help our community.

The birth of Christ's Closet was over 3 ½ years ago and was started by one of the Sunday School classes at Eastwood, in an attempt to reach out to the community. The initial goal was to help those in need of clothing. What started as a few clothes on tables blossomed into a regularly run operation with an overwhelming number of donations and benefactors (again we are so blessed!) This has fulfilled the initial goal and allowed us to reach out to the community in ways never imagined.

However, the larger quantities created storage and display problems. Our limited funds did not allow us to buy the sturdy racks we needed. So many of our racks would break and our need for storage to preserve donations from off season was growing. Our congregation supported some of our need for totes and storage racks to keep clothes clean, fresh and more organized, but our need had become rampant. The Hottle Grant solved both of these problems. We were able to purchase sturdy racks and more of them. We are now able to display more clothes and our display of clothes looks almost professional and radiates a positive environment to those whom utilize the



ministry. We were also able to make purchases for more totes and storage racks, and all are stored in an even more organized fashion, so locating what is needed is made easy.



The other needs facing us were the need to spread the word about our ministry and maintain proper records about our ministry. The Hottle Grant funds solved this problem with money for supplies to bring all our records and marketing projects to the church. Prior to this, all records were spread among members homes and were hard to access. Closely related, we were spending valuable funds with an outside printing company in order to facilitate any of our literature needs. However, again, this money from the grant will save Christ's Closet in cost and work efficiency for years to come in these areas of managing our ministry.

One additional unique request within the current grant funding, is the expanding of our new Free Uniform Program for Akron Public Schools. This program started at the beginning of the 2015-16 school year in August with third party grant money originating within the local community. The money parceled from the Hottle Grant, allotted to this project, added a 5th school to the mission, being one source to expand the program from last year's total distributions. This gives an additional 15 students, from an economically deprived school district, a uniform package that contains 2 pairs of pants, 3 polo shirts, and 3 pairs of socks. It is our hope that these 15 children will feel Christ's love in this gift.

This Hottle Grant has allowed Christ's Closet to grow in many ways and overcome previous barriers. We were unable to achieve this success prior to these provisions. Christ's Closet has realized the accomplishment of being a near professional operation with the support of our community, volunteers (especially Marilyn and Michelle Gryder), congregation, our district and the direction from our Lord. We are appreciative of all the support and know that God has blessed all of the individuals who have contributed in both time and resources. Christ's Closet continues as a family, in an outward display of love, as we grow in a way that best reflects God's plan for our community mission.
