# Annual Conference pivots from hybrid to online event in 2021

A release from the Program and Arrangements Committee of the Church of the Brethren Annual Conference

The Program and Arrangements Committee has determined that the 2021 Annual Conference will be entirely online. The Adventutous Future

committee hoped to have a hybrid (both in-person and online) Conference as announced last fall. However, due to the continuing challenges of COVID-19, the committee deemed that it is not wise to have an in-person component for Annual Conference this summer. As Program and Arrangements Committee has consistently stressed, the health and safety of Annual Conference participants is the highest priority.

This was a difficult decision to make since last summer's Annual Conference needed to be cancelled entirely because of COVID-19. While we know that meeting in person eventually will be safe again, we sadly do not believe that it will happen in time to safely have an in-person event at the end of June 2021.

This will be the first time that the Church of the Brethren Annual Conference has gathered entirely online, as many of our congregations have been doing these past 10 months. While we lament that we cannot be together in person to hug one another, sing together, and eat at tables together, we are nevertheless excited about the new opportunities an online gathering offers. We will be able to open Annual Conference to much greater participation than ever before.

# Registration Information from the Annual Conference Office

Registration for both delegates and non-delegates for the Church of the Brethren Annual Conference will open at 12:00 Noon Central Time on Tuesday, March 2, 2021. The delegate registration fee is \$305 per delegate. Churches up to 200 members should register one delegate, 201-400 members can register two delegates.

Please note: Unique to this year's ONLINE Annual Conference, each delegate MUST HAVE THEIR OWN PERSONAL EMAIL ADDRESS, A COMPUTER OR TABLET, AS WELL AS ADEQUATE WIFI SERVICE IN ORDER TO PARTICIPATE IN CONFERENCE. Please ensure that your selected delegate meets these requirements to participate so that your congregation can be fully represented at Annual Conference.\*

One online site will be used for all business, insight sessions, networking groups, concerts, Bible studies and more. A link and password for access to the site will be emailed to each registrant in the days prior to the start of Conference. Training sessions will be provided in the weeks before Conference begins for those wanting to learn how to navigate the site.

Non-Delegate registration will be \$99 and will provide access to all the events listed above. The charge is necessary to help cover all the costs of hosting a virtual event.

All five worship services will be available free of charge to all registered and non-registered persons.

# How to Report 2020 Congregational Statistics

When the denomination forms arrive for reporting your churches information, reporting attendance for 2020 will be a most unusual challenge. For many weeks, congregation did not meet. How do we average that in? Is on-line attendance counted?

The Yearbook office offers this guidance:

"We ask congregations to report their average attendance before their services were disrupted by COVID-19. That way we're comparing apples with apples...It's tough to find the perfect solution, but we are allowing congregations to self-report and hope to get a solid average attendance."

We encourage you to please complete your forms when they arrive. This information is helpful to the district as well as the denomination.

Thank you to all who have continued to give gifts, tithes and offerings this year. I wanted to share some of the wonderful things that have been occurring at church. Many of you have not been to the physical building, so I will share some pictures as well!

Over the months of November and December we collected quarters in the quarter pole for Heifer International. We filled it to the brim and had more to add, the total in quarters was \$145.50! In addition, members of our congregation gave cash and checks, with a total gift to Heifer International of **\$1,255.50**!!!. We purchased a heifer, a sheep, a hog, a goat, an alpaca, 2 honeybees, 2 flocks of ducks, 2 flocks of chicks, and 2 Hope baskets with rabbits and chickens. What awesome gifts!!

Also, a donation to Heifer in memory of Betty Kettering was given as a gift to Delbert Kettering, for providing his services for our Christmas Eve communion service. His message was

We also filled the mitten tree this year with hats (some really beautiful handmade), gloves, mittens, scarves and socks. These gifts will be divided between the Dale Roy school and Reagan Elementary to give to students who are in need. Items included: 32 pairs of gloves and mittens, 33 hats, 3 scarves and 11 pairs of socks.

Our White Gift offering was designated to go to Inspiration Hills Camp. As many of you are aware, our district camp had to cancel the in person camps this year, and so had very limited income in this year of COVID. Our gift from Christmas Eve service totaled \$835.00.

Clinking coin gifts were also collected in our little bucket, totaling \$82.28. This will be added to clinking coins collected earlier in the year (\$135.43) and added to our white gift offering to Inspiration Hills.

There were also some gifts given to Associated Charities for the food pantry! We also delivered 13 stuffed fun Christmas stockings to our shut ins...

#### Not so bad for a "little" church!

We continue to meet on Sunday mornings, masks are required. We have plenty of space to properly social distance, as seen in the picture!

Our next project will be collecting items and monies for Church World Service Health Kits. Items may be purchased and brought into the church, or checks can be mailed to support this project. This will be ongoing through February. Please ask me if you have any questions!

Items include: toothbrushes (individual in packaging), nail clippers, wash clothes, hand towels, band aids, <u>wide</u> tooth combs, full size bars of soap, and gallon size zipper storage bags.

# Brook Park Community Church of the Brethren Hottle Grant Report Article provided by Mark Pollock, BPCCOB Board Chair

Brook Park Community Church of the Brethren installed a worship center video recording and live streaming system with the money we received from the Northern Ohio Hottle Grants. We applied for and were approved for the \$5000 grant in May of 2019. With the money we were able to purchase a Pan, Tilt, and Zoom video camera from PTZ Optics, a joy stick controller for the camera, a compact computer to control everything, a monitor, Filmora video editing software, an upgrade to our WiFi, a video and sound control desk and chair, electrical wiring and cables for the system, and OBS software that allows us to live stream and record our services.

One of the big delays in getting the system up and running was getting a high speed WiFi/internet connection. Our existing connection had an upload speed less than 1 gigabyte/sec and the expects recommended at least a 10 gbps upload speed for live streaming. The provider we originally had could not upgrade to those speeds so we had to get a new provider. Several providers advertised higher speed connections, but none of them had a connection to our church. Verizon had a connection about 2 blocks away which they extended to our church building. Fortunately they waived the \$4000 installation fee!

To insure uninterrupted internet connections, we hard wired the control computer in the sanctuary to the internet connection which was about 100' away. PTZ Optics was the camera and controller company we selected. They are very involved in church/worship service videoing and offered a "Producer Kit" which included the computer, the pan, tilt, zoom camera, the joy

stick camera controller, the audio interface connector, the video interface connector and cabling. The kit was about \$2500, but all the components were designed to work together and the PTZ camera allows us to have one camera at the back of the sanctuary that can move (pan) to where ever we want and to zoom into closeups or out for wide shots. The system also allowed us to use our existing sound board and microphones for good quality sound pickup. The OBS software is a free software package that allows coordinating all the components and live streaming. We also purchased a video editing software program called "Filmora" to edit and splice together video recordings when we were prerecording our services and putting them together to send out to YouTube. I was able to complete the installation of the equipment with a little help from others, but when it came to running and understanding the video editing and live streaming I enlisted the help of my daughter and son-inlaw who are much more tech savvy to make the system work smoothly.

With all of the new equipment, we needed a "control center". We built a 3' x 8' counter/desk at the back of the sanctuary to house all the equipment. It was big enough to also house the sound board and amplification equipment we already had. We installed a mounting pole on the corner of the desk for the camera. This allowed it to be close to the control center to minimize cabling, but up high enough to allow people to walk in front of it and not interfere with the picture. The zoom feature of the camera allows close ups of the preacher in the pulpit and the band.

The grant money was a real blessing and the timing really worked to our advantage. We had intended to move to a live streaming system for our worship services, but when the Covid-19 virus forced us to close our Sunday morning inperson worship services, it was a life saver. It allowed us to continue to reach our congregation each Sunday with a safe, socially-distanced, recorded service on YouTube. Today we are back to live services and are using the system for live streaming with a prerecorded zoom call children's message.

Another part of the original grant was a TV monitor that we mounted in our Church vestibule. The original intent was to provide information about our congregation and denomination when we had people using our "Audrey's Outreach" food bank. The virus forced us to go to a drive through distribution system, but the TV is still available to play informational messages.

We want to thank the District for providing the grant that
